### STANDARD OPERATING PROCEDURE (SOP) ON PLANNING AND IMPLEMENTING CONTRIBUTING COUNTRY RECONNAISSANCE VISITS

### **ANNEXURE**

### A. PURPOSE

1. The purpose of this SOP is to provide detailed procedures for planning, implementing and reporting country reconnaissance in accordance with the DPKO Policy Directive on Contributing Country Reconnaissance.

### B. SCOPE

2. This SOP is subsidiary to the DPKO Policy Directive on Contributing Country Reconnaissance. All personnel involved with the planning and implementation of specific reconnaissance are required to follow this SOP. Organizational elements in UNHQ, contributing countries and missions might need to augment this SOP with local procedures. However, any local procedure that substitutes, changes or in any other way modifies this SOP will not be recognised.

### C. RATIONALE

3. The SOP sets out the actions and information necessary for meeting the policy requirements for contributing country reconnaissance. Importantly, the linkages between reconnaissance, pre-deployment visits (PDV) and memorandum of understanding (MOU) negotiation procedures should be direct and closely coordinated.

### D. PROCEDURES

### D.1 Planning

- 4. Reconnaissance should be conducted sufficiently in advance of deployment for practical implementation of the findings. DPKO force generation and police generation staff are to seek timely approval for inviting the contributing country to conduct reconnaissance in the mission area. In the case of military contingents, the appropriate staff is Force Generation Service (FGS) and for police contingents, Police Division (PD).
- 5. USG DPKO approves the invitation based on recommendations from relevant DPKO areas. Approval is sought in a routing slip and a specimen is at Annex A. The invitation shall be sent to the Permanent Mission of the contributing country. It shall convey the purpose, key locations, maximum number of reimbursable participants, duration and estimated UNHQ travel expenditure. The determination of participant numbers and duration shall be made on a case-by-case consideration of relevant CONOPS tasks. Each peace operation has specific CONOPS requirements, environment and

- circumstances that uniquely distinguish it from other peace operations. The details conveyed in the invitation shall be determined in consultation with the UN mission.
- 6. Where warranted, a joint DPKO, mission and contributing country reconnaissance might take place in the mission area. No more than two DPKO personnel from UNHQ should participate in the joint reconnaissance.
- 7. The Permanent Mission should respond to the invitation with a written proposal giving a suggested itinerary, preferred dates and the names and appointments of the participants. The itinerary must cover the locations in the mission area that are essential for undertaking the tasks specified in the CONOPS. The contributing country arranges the return travel for its participants to the mission area. DPKO, in conjunction with the UN mission, arranges accommodation, travel and other administrative support in the mission area. The contributing country shall coordinate its travel arrangements within the mission area through the force generation or police generation staff, as appropriate.
- 8. Contributing country participants should include as a minimum the designated contingent commander and a logistics expert. Larger reconnaissance teams should include expert representatives from force protection and enabling capability areas. For new missions, larger teams might not be able to conduct reconnaissance of all the key locations. Limited access might arise due to local security circumstances or insufficient UN presence. In such cases, the reconnaissance could be phased and part of the team could delay reconnaissance until circumstances are more favourable.
- 9. The reconnaissance proposal should be forwarded in sufficient time for full consultations and arranging travel and visa entry. Processing the proposal within the UN shall be coordinated by the appropriate force generation or police generation staff. For military proposals, consultations should include the contributing country, mission and relevant areas of Military Division (MD), Mine Action Service (UNMAS), Operational Support Service (OSS), Specialist Support Service (SSS), Financial Management Support Service (FMSS) and Office of Operations (OO). In the case of police contributions, consultation should be with appropriate partners. Consultants shall reach agreement on the details of the proposal. Based on the recommendations from relevant DPKO areas, USG DPKO approves the agreed reconnaissance proposal.

### D.2 Implementation

- 10. The reconnaissance shall be conducted in close partnership by contributing country participants and appropriate UN operations and logistics staff. The partnership must give impetus to identifying the likely issues arising from specific key locations and associated infrastructure and environmental factors. Solutions to the issues should be agreed and include clear responsibilities accepted by the contributing country and the mission to take action, meet timings and coordinate. The details of identified issues and agreed solutions should form annexes to the reconnaissance report.
- 11. Recommendations on the suitability of contingent capabilities must be made in full consultation with the mission. A key factor affecting suitability is mission support in terms of unified operations and integrated logistics. Contingent capabilities are supported by relevant substantive and enabling capabilities in unified operations under sector or force arrangements. The contingent is also supported by the mission sourcing UN owned equipment, commercial services, sites for camps and available capacities of local infrastructure.
- 12. Making recommendations on the overall suitability of contingent capabilities must be done carefully. Suitability should be based on all elements contributing to specific

capabilities including personnel, training, organization, procedures, major equipment, self-sustainment, consumables re-supply and equipment maintenance. The end effect of combining the elements is decisive. National diversity of procedures and techniques in achieving the end effect should be accommodated as far as practicable. On completion of the reconnaissance, UN staff shall discuss and draft with contributing country representatives a brief summary of overall suitability and unresolved issues.

### D.3 Reconnaissance Report

13. The purpose of the reconnaissance report is to submit for decision any unresolved issues arising from the effects of ground on the contingent's capability to undertake its CONOPS tasks. The body of the report should be concise, less than five pages and include technical details in annexes. It should consist of an introduction, purpose, overall suitability of contingent capabilities, unresolved issues, resolved issues and agreed responsibilities, other issues, conclusions and recommendations. A specimen layout of the reconnaissance report is at Annex B.

### D.4 Finance

- 14. Contributing country reconnaissance, including joint activities, are cross-cutting and budget arrangements need close coordination between MD, CPD, OMS and missions. MilAd and PolAd, in consultation with DLSD, DMAS and FMSS need to determine the operational requirements for reconnaissance. MilAd and PolAd should ensure that sufficient travel expenses to meet the requirements are accurately estimated and included in cost estimates. For new missions, the estimates need to be in the commitment authority budget including, where appropriate, the pre-mandate budget.
- 15. DPKO bears the travel expenses of any staff member approved to participate in a joint activity with contributing country reconnaissance. Contributing country travel costs are reimbursed subject to the conditions below and in accordance with the Financial Regulations and Rules of the UN. The reimbursement is made through the Permanent Mission. Any actual expenses that are incurred in excess of eligible reimbursement rests with the contributing country. USG DPKO may agree to the inclusion by contributing countries of additional personnel above the number of reimbursable participants. However, DPKO will not bear the travel expenses of additional personnel to the mission area or the cost of accommodation or meals. Any requirement by the contributing country to extend the duration of reconnaissance in the mission area beyond five days needs the specific agreement of the mission and USG DPKO. All travel expenses incurred in the mission area by the approved reconnaissance team are borne by DPKO.
- 16. Contributing country expenses are eligible for reimbursement by DPKO under the following conditions:
  - 16.1. The contributing country submits the reconnaissance proposal, coordinates with the appropriate force generation or police generation staff and partners with UN staff in completing the reconnaissance.
  - 16.2. The reconnaissance itinerary, including travel and accommodation arrangements, is agreed by the mission and MilAd or, as appropriate, PolAd.
  - 16.3. The contributing country deploys its reconnaissance team to the mission area and, upon completion of travel, submits a claim to the UN Travel Unit through its permanent Mission in New York. The claim must include original air tickets and boarding passes. Reimbursement to contributing countries will be limited to what it would have cost the UN to arrange.
  - 16.4. Air transport is to be economy or tourist class for the most direct and economical commercial route between the contributing country and the mission area. Daily

- subsistence allowance (DSA) will be reimbursed to the contributing country in accordance with the established UN practice for workshop and meeting participants. The practice is based on the actual number of days in the mission area according to the air ticket plus one extra day to cover all transit, terminal and miscellaneous expenses. Where the UN provides meals and accommodation to the reconnaissance participants, the UN reimburses DSA at 20 percent of the full rate.
- 16.5. If the contributing country does not deploy its unit after undertaking a reconnaissance, the UN reserves the right to reject a claim for reimbursement of the travel and subsistence costs. The UN reserves the right also to recover the amount spent by the UN on these costs. However, if the UN cancels the deployment of a unit from the contributing country, the UN will bear the cost of the reconnaissance.
- 17. The overall limits of DPKO reimbursement to each contributing country for travel expenses are up to a maximum five days in the mission area for up to a maximum number of participants as listed in Table 1. Adjustments within the overall limits depend on CONOPS requirements.
